

Life Saving Organ and Tissue Donation



Once every 48 hours, an Ohioan dies waiting for a life-saving organ transplant. Right now, there are more than 108,000 men, women and children on the national transplant waiting list for a lifesaving organ. In the last ten years, more than 2,000 Ohioans have died waiting. In Ohio, there are more than 3,100 people including about 700 in Central Ohio, waiting for a lifesaving organ transplant. As transplantation of hearts, kidneys, lungs, pancreases and livers has emerged as the preferred and most successful treatment of many life-threatening diseases, the need for these life-saving gifts has increased. The Franklin County Coroner's Office continues to strongly support organ, tissue and eye donation with its partners, Lifeline of Ohio and the Central Ohio Lions Eye Bank.

FATALITY REVIEW BOARDS

The Franklin County Coroner's Office participates in several fatality review boards. The boards involve numerous public health and other specialists to review the circumstances around certain kinds of deaths and make recommendations on how to prevent these kinds of deaths in the future. The panels select a sample of the deaths in Franklin County and examine them in detail through the eyes of experts in the hope that these unfortunate decedents can assist in decreasing mortality in our community.

The FCCO forensic pathologists, investigators and other staff participate in the following committees:

- **Traffic:** This committee examines the circumstances around deaths involving vehicles, including deaths to pedestrians and drivers and passengers in other vehicles like bicycles and motorcycles. The circumstances around these deaths include the physical surroundings including road dimensions and design, vehicle speeds and time of day and/or season of the year.
- **Sudden Unexplained Infant Deaths (SUID):** As of September 2014, Ohio coroners are required to complete a death scene investigation using the CDC protocol and a standard investigation reporting form. The investigation form is to be shared with the local Child Fatality Review board reviewing the death. Some of these SUID are diagnosed as accidental suffocation, positional asphyxia, overlay (the obstruction of breathing caused by the weight of a person or animal lying on the infant), or undetermined.
- **Child:** This committee examines several major causes of unexpected child deaths under the age of 18 years, including through vehicular accidents; abuse and neglect; firearms and weapons; drowning; and other causes often related to safety.
- **Suicides:** Utilizing our Suicide Investigations Specialist, this committee examines the psychosocial factors that may have influenced the decedent to take his or her own life.
- **Overdose:** The rash of overdose deaths in our community has made the work of this committee more important than ever. The committee examines the circumstances leading up to the death, but also examines trends in the availability of the drugs and substances that result in the overdose deaths.
- **Domestic Violence:** This panel examines deaths, both homicides and suicides, caused by domestic violence, for examination of the systemic interventions into known incidents of domestic violence occurring in the family of the deceased prior to the death, for consideration of altered systemic response to avert future domestic violence deaths, or for development of recommendations for coordinated community prevention and intervention initiatives to eradicate domestic violence.

SUICIDE INVESTIGATIONS & POSTVENTION SPECIALIST **DALLAS ALLEN**

Dallas Allen is the Suicide Investigations and Postvention Specialist at the Franklin County Forensic Science Center, Office of the Coroner in Columbus, Ohio. Dallas conducts full psychosocial investigations, facilitates the Franklin County Suicide Fatality Review Committee and provides grief support to individuals who have lost loved ones to suicide. As of July 2021, Dallas became the first person in the nation to hold this title within a medicolegal office.

In addition to his position at the Coroner's office, Dallas is also a board member for LOSS Community Services, the vice-chair of the Franklin County Suicide Prevention Coalition, and a Resource and Care Connections Committee member for the Attorney General's Task Force on Criminal Justice and Mental Illness.

OVERDOSE SPECIALIST **VANESSA GAY**

Vanessa Gay is the Overdose Specialist at the Franklin County Forensic Science Center, Office of the Coroner in Columbus, Ohio. Vanessa conducts full psychosocial investigations, participates in the Overdose Fatality Review Board, and provides grief support to individuals who have lost loved ones to an overdose.

In addition to her position at the coroner's office, Vanessa works as a Registered Nurse at a level 1 trauma center. Here she works as a Forensic Nurse Examiner working with survivors of sexual assault and domestic violence. She is currently pursuing her master's degree in forensic nursing.

Manner of Death: Accidental

An accidental death is a result of an unnatural cause where there is no evidence of intent to cause harm and the fatal outcome was unintentional.





Manner of Death: Natural

A natural death is one due to a spontaneous or naturally occurring disease or degenerative process. A death so classified can fall under the jurisdiction of the Coroner because of the sudden or unexpected nature of the death, because there was no physician with knowledge or awareness of the decedent's condition, or when circumstances surrounding the death arouse suspicion.





A suicide is a death resulting from a self-inflicted injury which ends one's life.




Manner of Death: Homicide

A homicide death is a death resulting from a voluntary action committed by another person. A homicide is not necessarily a murder. This classification does not necessarily indicate criminal intent, which is determined by the legal process.



Homocide Deaths By Race And Gender






Homicide Deaths by Age (2024)

“Undetermined” is a classification used when the information pointing to one manner of death is no more compelling than one or more other competing manners of death in thorough consideration of all available information.





Accidental Acute Intoxication Deaths by Years, Gender, Race, and Ethnicity




Accidental Acute Intoxication Deaths by Years




2024 Accidental Acute Intoxication Age-Specific Death Rate (Per 100,000) by Gender, Race, and Ethnicity


Accidental Acute Intoxication Deaths Involving Selected Substances or Combination of Substances by Years





2024 Franklin County Suicide Deaths by Race and Ethnicity





Suicide Age-Adjusted Death Rates (Per 100,000) by Year, Race, and Ethnicity










Suicide Age-Adjusted Death Rates (Per 100,000) by Year, Race, and Ethnicity



2024 Franklin County Homicides


Geographic Location

Unidentified Persons

Determining the identity of remains is one of the first steps in a medicolegal death investigation. A variety of methods are used at the Franklin County Coroner's Office to research and confirm a decedent's identity. If the identification is in question at the time the body is admitted, our team will begin to identify what tools or resources are needed to identify the decedent.

Most identifications are resolved within days to weeks; however, in some cases no identification leads can be found, and cases must be submitted to national missing persons database, The National Missing and Unidentified Persons System (NAMUS).

Currently, less than 10 individuals, including some dating back to the 1980s, remain unidentified in Franklin County. Our team members continue to work with stakeholders, such as the Attorney General's Bureau of Criminal Investigation, to match these with missing persons and participates in Missing Person Day events in Ohio to attempt to gather leads.






2024 Expenditures



BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS FOR 2024

- Total Expenditures \$10,818,114.
- Franklin County Coroner's Office is properly staffed to manage Franklin County case load.
- Expanded internships, residencies and other educational opportunities to train the next generation of forensic medicine specialists.
- Employed a suicide investigator and an overdose investigator to evaluate suicides and overdose deaths and to draw on this knowledge to prevent future suicides and/or overdose deaths.





Fatality Preparedness & Management

To effectively respond to an incident from mass casualty to severe weather related (e.g. tornados) incidents, the increase of incidents across the country has highlighted an emerging threat that requires comprehensive planning and preparation prior to the incident taking place. The Coroner's Office will work with all public safety services agencies within Franklin County to develop a plan, conduct training and exercises, and purchase equipment necessary to support this type of incident.


The FCCO engages with the public and our partner agencies through education, training, exercises and drills, and community outreach to assist our residents and first responders with preparedness. Additionally, FCCO personnel collaborate with partners to review and revise our Mass Fatality Plan and to prepare for the variety of hazards that could impact our community.

Fatality preparedness and management is the ability to coordinate with other organizations (e.g., law enforcement, healthcare, and emergency management) to ensure the proper recovery, handling, identification, transportation, tracking, storage, and disposition of human remains and personal effects; certify cause of death; and facilitate access to mental/behavioral health services to the family members, responders, and survivors of an incident. Fatality Management Services is one of the 32 Federal Core Capabilities in support of the National Preparedness Goal.
